STOP AIDS includes transmen in their HIV risk questionnaire, which allows men to identify as trans and includes questions about frontal (vaginal) sex. monthly events for transguys who play with guys, and the guys who play with us, at Eros, The Center for Safe Sex (2051 Market Street, SF, CA). Events happen on the 2nd Thursdays (Movie Nights from 7:30-9PM) and 4th Thursdays (Alternating Workshop/Discussion Group from 7-9PM) of each month; as well as “Cruising Nights” once a month at various bars around town. TIP was founded in partnership with Prevention Point Philadelphia and GALAEI in 2003. TIP is the only peer-staffed, multi-service trans organization in Philadelphia. TIP aims to reduce HIV transmission, and other harms associated with hormone/silicone use, unprotected sex, sex-work, disclosure, violence, and systemic transphobia through individual level counseling, group level education, resource brokerage, capacity building, case advocacy and representation. TIP also seeks to support community building, and to further the self-determination, well-being and advancement of all T/GV people.
